

Jennifer is the Founder and President of Media Street Productions Inc., a twenty-five-year old, award-winning media company in Windsor, Ontario. She is a proud member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland.

Her talents have strengthened Rotary reach and impact, through many roles including as Trustee of the Rotary Foundation, RI Vice President, and co-chair of the *End Polio Now: Make History Today* campaign, raising funds alongside Bill and Melinda Gates and their Foundation.

Jennifer is a leader in cultivating "experiential fundraising" opportunities such as Rotary's Polio Golf Day with Jack Nicklaus in Jupiter, Florida, USA, which raised over \$5.25 million for polio eradication in one day. Or, the innovative, virtual COVID-19 #RotaryResponds event that raised money for COVID-19 relief projects and showcased Rotary's response across the globe.

Working alongside political figures, celebrities and global leaders, she uses her voice to raise *awareness* and *hundreds of millions* of dollars to eradicate disease, support peace and provide clean water and sanitation in developing areas of the world. Her skill as an expert storyteller inspires hope and promise and motivates people to take action.

She has received many honors and recognitions including Rotary's Service Above Self Award and the Citation for Meritorious Service, the YMCA Peace Medallion, the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal, and Wayne State University's Peacemaker of the Year Award – a first for a Canadian.

Jennifer is married to Rotarian Nick Krayacich, a local family physician. They share a love for many things including travel, cycling, golf and relaxing at their family cottage; and they share a thirst for adventure, which has included cresting the summit of Mount Kilimanjaro in Tanzania, Africa.





Herb Klotz Zone 32 Rotary Coordinator

Herb joined Rotary in 2011 and is a member of the Allentown West Rotary Club near Allentown, PA. He is currently the Zone 32 Rotary Coordinator which covers the Northeast United States and is responsible for promoting membership growth. Dr. Tunji Funsho Chair, Rotary's Nigeria National PolioPlus Committee

A Rotarian for 35 years, Dr. Funsho is a member of the Rotary Club of Lekki, Nigeria, past governor of District 9110, and serves on Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee. Dr. Funsho is a cardiologist and a fellow of the Royal College of Physicians of London. He lives in Lagos, Nigeria with his wife Aisha. They have four children; Habeeb, Kike, Abdullahi and Fatima; and five grandchildren.

TIME 100 comprises individuals whose leadership, talent, discoveries, and philanthropy have made a difference in the world. Past honorees include Bono, the Dalai Lama, Bill Gates, Nelson Mandela, Angela Merkel, Oprah Winfrey, and Malala Yousafzai.

"I'm honored to be recognized by TIME for my part in ensuring that no child in Africa will ever again be paralyzed by wild polio, a disease that once disabled 75,000 African children every single year," said Dr. Funsho. "Eradicating the wild poliovirus in Africa was a team effort that required cooperation and dedication of governments, partners, Rotary members, hundreds of thousands of health workers, and countless parents who chose to have their children vaccinated against polio."

As the chair of Rotary's Nigeria National PolioPlus Committee, since 2013 Dr. Funsho has led PolioPlus efforts in the country, building upon the work of his predecessors. He has worked alongside Rotarians in Nigeria to raise awareness about the importance of polio immunization, encouraged governments and public figures to support polio eradication, and served as a vocal leader and advocate for Rotary and its fight to end polio. He works closely with the Global Polio Eradication Initiative partner organizations: the World Health Organization (WHO), UNICEF, the UNICEF, the UNICEF, the UNICEF, the UNICEF, the USCONTION ORGANICATION ORGANICA

As a member of Nigeria's Presidential Task Force on Polio, he has coordinated immunizations and advocacycampaigns with the Minister of State for Health and the Inter-Agency Coordination Committee for Polio Eradication. He has also worked closely with the Sir Emeka Offor Foundation, the Dangote Foundation, the Traditional Leaders Council and the Federation of Muslim Women's Association of Nigeria.

In August 2019, Nigeria reached three years without a case of wild poliovirus. Nigeria's progress, <u>led by Rotary</u>, its partners and local and national governments, was the result of decades of sustained efforts, including domestic and international financing, the commitment of hundreds of thousands of health workers, and innovative strategies to immunize children who previously couldn't be reached due to insecurity in the country's northern states.

On 25 August, the African region was certified wild polio-free. This historic announcement means that five of the WHO's six regions, representing more than 90 percent of the world's population, are now free of the wild poliovirus. The <u>virus is still endemic</u> in Afghanistan and Pakistan.

With Africa's milestone, Rotary and its partners took a major step forward toward their goal of global eradication. Funsho told TIME magazine of the achievement: "The polio eradication program in Nigeria has gone through some difficult times, but I never once doubted that this day would come. Any time that we've experienced a setback, Rotary and our partners have been able to find solutions and develop strategies for reaching vulnerable children."

He added: "One thing I know for certain, is if Nigeria could eliminate the wild poliovirus, any country can eliminate it."



Carolyn Jones Past Rotary Foundation Trustee

Carolyn is recognized for her distinguished 25 year leadership role in Rotary International, from President of her Anchorage, Alaska club to the first woman to be appointed as a trustee of The Rotary Foundation. She has been recognized for her lasting humanitarian contribution as a Rotary volunteer with children in eastern Russian orphanages by both the Alaska State Legislature and the Tomsk Russian Duma, Carolyn's career as an attorney in Alaska, litigating laws to make more opportunities for all Americans, has been recognized by the State of Alaska Commission for Human Rights. Carolyn has traveled to Russia 35 times in her service to Rotary—five of those trips as a Rotary volunteer. Her story "The Children of Russia" was published in July 2002 issue of the Rotarian Magazine and in "Chicken Soup for the Volunteers' Soul".

Carolyn grew up in Tarrytown, NY and graduated from Stamford University and received her law degree from Yale Law School. Quoting Carolyn; "Her activities are too numerous to mention and so she won't. All in all, she has received a lot of awards and recognitions in her lifetime for which she is honored and too embarrassed to enumerate."

Carolyn continues to serve humanitarian needs in several capacities through Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation, and is sought after as a speaker in many areas, including Diversity, Equity and Inclusion.

In addition, Dr. Roberts served as an Assistant Governor for 3 years in Area 2 of his District.

His clinical practice is focused on diverse populations and his consulting practice focuses on coaching leaders in organizations engaged in making change.


